

ELIGIBLE ACTIVITIES

- Any service for non-profit organizations, churches, or schools
- An organization requiring a person to volunteer his/her time for a charity
- **The following Christian Community Service opportunities are common at Saint Francis Catholic Secondary School:** Pilgrimage, Stair Climb for Cancer, Out of the Cold, Pro-life initiatives, S. C. O. E. P., P3 tutoring (no bonus marks), Grape & Wine Parade, Charitable walks/runs (Terry Fox)
- Unpaid academic tutoring
- Coaching → only if coaches are volunteering
- Charitable activities (church bazaars, pancake/spaghetti suppers)
- YMCA/ YWCA
- Hospitals/Hospices and Nursing homes (e.g., facilitating recreational activities)
- Community Care (905.227.9240)
- Habitat for Humanity Niagara (905.685.7395)
- Snow Buddies (905.682.3800)
- Humane Society
- Boys and Girls Club
- Chaplain's Crew (after school) SEE CHAPLAIN
- Parish/church ministries (reading, serving, singing etc.)
- Scorekeeping/managing school teams (part of co-curricular involvement)
- ALL activities MUST be pre-approved by your Religion Teacher
- **Announcements and Christian Community Service bulletin boards provide numerous opportunities.**
- **NOTE: Eligible activities included above are common examples at Saint Francis but students are not limited to these suggestions.**

INELIGIBLE ACTIVITIES

- Work for a workplace or business (private or commercial)
- Work normally done by a person who earns a wage
- Requirement for a course in which the student is enrolled. (Example: Co-Op)
- Work (for pay) at Club Halls
- Any activity that takes place during school (lunch and spares are excluded)
- Duties (chores) such as baby-sitting, shovelling snow, raking leaves for family/friends
- Activities completed for pay/reward (i.e. bonus marks)
- Parent or relative signatures for the completion of activities
- Personal recreational activities
- Work for a Political Party and/or candidate
- Work for any form of payment (i.e. money, gifts, bartering)
- Any association with an organization or activity that conflicts with the ethical standards and teachings of the Catholic Church
- Alternative placement hours in lieu of suspension and/or detention as initiated/coordinated by school administration
- **REMINDER → If unsure, please ask a Religion Teacher, Chaplain, Administration or Student Services Department**

PURPOSE OF DOCUMENT

This document provides information about the Christian Community Service (CCS) grade level and overall diploma requirements for students and parents/guardians.

CHRISTIAN COMMUNITY SERVICE REQUIREMENTS

As stated by the Ontario Ministry of Education (1999), **ALL** students must complete 40 hours of Community Service in order to receive their Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD). It is the policy of the Niagara Catholic District School Board that students complete a minimum of 10 hours of Christian Community Service and associated project(s) per year. All students must have their assigned hours recorded in their Religion classes each year. The 10 hour requirement will be monitored by the student's Religion teacher. The following grade levels will need to complete the mandatory CCS hours in Religious Studies:

GRADE 9: Students must complete a minimum of 10 hours by the semester deadline date

GRADE 10: Students must complete a minimum of 20 hours by the semester deadline date

GRADE 11: Students must complete a minimum of 30 hours by the semester deadline date

GRADE 12: Students must complete a minimum of 40 hours by the semester deadline date

CHRISTIAN COMMUNITY SERVICE

Christian Community Service in the Niagara Catholic District School Board enables students to show solidarity with people who are in need and who require assistance. It provides students with an opportunity to follow the teaching of Jesus Christ and puts into practice the social teaching of the Church.

In its authentic and primary sense, Christian service is inspired by Jesus' teaching and example, extended to those who are in need or who suffer in any way, and offered in the spirit of human solidarity that reflects Jesus' statement that "whatever you do the least among you, you do it to me". Being a good neighbour refers to the great teaching of Christ from the Gospel of Luke entitled "The Parable of the Good Samaritan", where we are called to be a good neighbour and help those in need. It is clear from this source that service is directed towards those who need us most. Each student's experience will address curriculum expectations and culminate by completing the assignment where reflection on their service is evaluated.

ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

STUDENTS

In consultation with their parents/guardians, students are responsible for selecting approved Christian Community Service activities. It is the responsibility of the student to complete all required documentation and submit them within the required timelines. It is advised that students make a duplicate/photocopy of all Christian Community Service forms before handing them in to their Religion teacher to avoid any discrepancies. **For incoming grade nine students please keep in mind that hours served in the summer, prior to the first semester are eligible to be counted as Christian Community Service.**

PARENTS/GUARDIANS

Parents/guardians should provide assistance to their son/daughter in the selection of their Christian Community Service activities. Parents/guardians are also encouraged to communicate with community sponsors and the school principal or program chair of Religion if they have any questions or concerns. A parent/guardian must sign the Notification of Planned Christian Community Service sheet and the Completion of Christian Community Service sheet, if the student is under eighteen years of age. We ask that neither a parent nor guardian sign to verify the hours.
