What You Need to Graduate



Religion Credits:

All students are required to successfully complete a Religious Education course in each year of secondary school.

18 Compulsory Credits:

Students must earn the following compulsory credits to obtain the Ontario Secondary School Diploma:

- 4 credits in English (1 credit per grade)*
- 3 credits in Mathematics (1 credit in grade 11 or 12)
- 2 credits in Science
- 1 credit in Canadian History
- 1 credit in Canadian Geography
- 1 credit in The Arts
- 1 credit in Health and Physical Education
- 1 credit in French as a Second Language
- 0.5 credit in Career Studies
- 0.5 credit in Civics

Plus one credit from each of the following groups:

Group 1: Additional credit in English or French as a second language, (grade 10) or a Native language or a Classical or an International Language or Social Sciences and the Humanities or Canadian and World Studies or Guidance and Career Education, or Cooperative Education.

Group 2: Additional credit in Health and Physical Education or the Arts or Business Studies or French as a second language (grade 10) or Cooperative Education.

Group 3: Additional credit in Science (Grade 11 or 12) or Technological Education or French as a second language (grade 10) or Computer Studies or Cooperative Education.

In addition to the compulsory credits, students must complete:

- 8 Optional Credits
- 40 Hours of Community Involvement Activities
- Provincial Literacy Requirement
- 2 E-Learning Credits

How to Choose My Grade 9 Program?

Where to Begin? The first thing to do is to choose the level of course to take in Grade 9: Destreamed / Open or Locally Developed?

De-Streamed / Open

De-streamed or Open Courses are designed to prepare students for further study in a subject, and to enrich their education.

These courses may lead to College / University.



Locally Developed

If De-streamed/Open courses are not appropriate, you may wish to select a Locally Developed essential course. These courses are offered in English, Science and Math. Such courses may accommodate your educational and/or career preparation needs. Once you successfully complete a Locally Developed essential course in Grade 9, you may continue with Locally Developed courses or possibly take Gr.9 Destreamed.

These courses may lead to Workplace / College.

Grade 10 also includes:

Academic

In an Academic course, you will learn the core concepts of a subject and explore related material as well. Although your knowledge and skills in the subject will be developed through both theory and practical applications. The emphasis will be on theory and abstract thinking as a basis for future learning and problem solving.

These courses may lead to College / University.

Applied

An Applied course covers the core concepts of a subject. Knowledge and skills will be developed through both theory and practical applications, but the focus will be on the practical applications. In applied courses familiar and real life situations will be used to illustrate ideas, and you will be given more opportunities to experience hands-on applications of the concepts you study.

These courses may lead to College.

Gr. 9 Compusiory Courses

De-Streaming: It is our commitment to enable all students in eliminating all forms of discrimination. The Ministry of Education indicated that de-streaming will reduce systematic barriers for all students when considering pathways and future opportunities. All students in Grade 9 will complete the following compulsory courses:



MATH: MTH1W De-streamed OR MAT1L Locally Developed SCIENCE: SNC1W De-streamed OR SNC1L Locally Developed












Gr. 9 Optional Courses

SNC

These 3 letters identify the subject

The first letter in the course code identifies the curriculum area as follows:

- A = Arts
- B = Business
- C = Canadian and World Studies
- E = English
- F = French
- G = Guidance
- H = Humanities & Social Science
- K = Alternative, Non-Credit Courses
- L = International Languages
- M = Mathematics
- N = Native Studies
- P = Physical Education
- S = Sciences
- T = Technological Education

This number identifies the grade as follows:

- 1 = Grade 9
- 2 = Grade 10
- 3 = Grade 11
- 4 = Grade 12

This letter identifies the stream/ destination

Grade 9-10

- D/W = Destreamed
- L = Locally Developed
- O = Open
- P = Applied

Grade 11-12

- E = Workplace
- C = College
- M = University/College
- O = Open
- U = University

Math Pathways

Math skills are critical in a number of Apprenticeship, College and University programs. There is not just one way to get to senior college and university math courses; there are a variety of pathway options. The choice between Academic and Applied is not always straightforward.

MTH1W Grade 9 De-streamed Math

The strands in the grade 9 De-streamed Math course are designed to build on those in Grade 8, while at the same time providing for growth in new directions in high school. At the end of the course, in consultation with the Math teacher, a recommendation will be made for an appropriate Grade 10 level of math for the following year.

MAT1L Grade 9 Locally Developed

Lessons and resources are focused on strengthening and extending key foundational mathematical concepts and skill by solving authentic everyday problems.

MPM2D

Lessons and resources are focused on skill development with an emphasis on theoretical and critical thinking.

MFM2P

Lessons and resources are strongly focused on skill development and learning strategies, targeting practical applications.

MAT2L

Lessons and resources are focused on strengthening and extending key foundational mathematical concepts and skill by solving authentic everyday problems.

MCR3U

Designed to meet requirements for all University programs including Science, Business and Engineering.

MCF3M

Designed to meet requirements for **some**University programs including Social Science and Humanities that may require Gr.12 Data Management and Technology-related programs for college.

MBF3C

Designed to meet
most college programs
such as Business,
Construction and
Computers or for
admission to

MEL3E

Designed to equip students with the knowledge and skills they need to meet the expectations of employers and some apprenticeship or training programs.

Religion Courses at Saint Francis

Our courses offer students an opportunity for individual spiritual growth which promotes inclusivity regardless of their elementary school background. Recognizing that our students come from an array of faith traditions, our Religion teachers support individual student learning with this in mind. Our grade nine and ten courses further include a cross-curricular literacy focus. Literacy skills specific to the secondary school experience are embedded concurrently throughout these courses. Students will approach the subject matter with a variety of skill building strategies such as metacognition, guided practice and paragraph building.

Grade 9 HRE10 Discipleship and Culture

This course invites students into a conversation between their own story and the lived story of the Christian community beginning in the Old Testament. Students develop their understanding of Catholic Social Teachings while actively engaging in a variety of challenging educational activities, including the Youth and Philanthropy Initiative.

Grade 10 HRE20 Christ and Culture

This course engages students to articulate Catholic beliefs and continue to journey as reflective, creative thinkers. By raising important questions, this course leads students to a deeper understanding of their relationship with their own spirituality and neighbours. Students are called to be caring family members and responsible citizens who respect and understand the history, cultural heritage, and pluralism of today's contemporary society.


- In the NCVLE, choose Digital Tools

- Relating school work to work experience
- Earning credits outside the classroom
- Get experience in different fields of interest
